


Aerial view of Tuscola taken in 2006, by Judy Miller and John Dixson. This picture shows Sale Street in Downtown Tuscola.

More Streets and Additions in Tuscola

Parkview Addition – Was developed by the Tuscola Lumber Company about 1959. Its streets include: Douglas Drive, Holiday Drive, Eldorado Drive, Fairlane Drive, Crestview Drive and Parkside Drive. A second addition was added in 1974.

Pine Court – Small street off of Northline Road between North Center Street and North Court Street.

Northgate Addition – Developed in 1973. The street running through this addition is Fleetwood Drive.

Raymond Drive – Named for Raymond Lee, attorney for Mr. Yoder who subdivided the ground.

Nancy Drive – Named for Nancy Smith who worked for Mr. Lee.

Doris Drive – Named for Doris Threet who worked for Mr. Lee. This street was never developed, but shows up on some of Tuscola maps.

Cherry Street – Small street off of the 400 block of North Ohio Street developed by Frank Michener.

Enterprise Street – Enterprise Addition, which the street runs through, was started by the Tuscola Chamber of Commerce.

Short Street – A "short" street, two blocks long running east and west through Enterprise Addition.

Timmons Drive – Named after Wayne and Beryl Timmons, who owned this ground and decided to subdivide it in 1954.

Beecher Drive – Was developed by Fred A. Smith in 1959. He owned a lumber business in Tuscola. E. G. Beecher worked for Smith.

Sunset Drive – Small street off of the 700 block of East Overton Street.

Chicago Avenue – A virtually abandoned street downtown that runs along the Illinois Central Railroad. Was named in honor of the Illinois Central Railroad officials who were from Chicago.

South Ward Square – Small street off of the 100 block of South Niles Street built on the site of the old South Ward School.

Holt Street – Small street off of the 900 block of East Wilson Street.

John Street – Small street off of the 900 block of Van Allen Street.

Fina Drive – Small street off of 900 block of South Washington Street named for Fina Liga.

Van Voorhis Drive – Small street off of the 900 block of South Washington Street named by Chris Hill in honor of Bill and Nell Van Voorhis.

Nicholas Drive – Small street off of the 900 block of South Washington Street

Luke Court and Hannah Court - Small streets off of Nicholas Drive.

Burke's Subdivision – H. C. Burke of Mattoon established The Tuscola Lumber Company in 1953. He developed two subdivisions in the southwest of the city.

Progress Boulevard and Tuscola Boulevard – Named by Tuscola City Council. The entrance to the mall and the street surrounding the mall.

Egyptian Trail – Old route beginning in Chicago and ending in Cairo, Illinois. Cities along the route include – Chicago, Kankakee, Urbana, Champaign, Tuscola, Arcola, Mattoon, Effingham, Salem, Centralia, Carbondale, Mound City and Cairo.

Meadowview Subdivision – Built in 1954, the streets include – Meadowview Drive, Fairview Drive, Glenview Drive, Pleasantview Drive and Eastview Drive.

Southland Acres Subdivision – Built in 1959, the streets include – Southland Drive North, Key Drive, Southland Circle Drive and Southland Drive South.

Hillcrest Addition – Built in 1959 off Egyptian Trail, it is not incorporated into the city. The streets include – Hillcrest Drive, Maple Circle, Pine Circle, Walnut Circle, Cedar Circle, Poplar Drive and Cherry Drive.

Tuscola's Additions off of North Prairie Street

North Prairie Acres Subdivision – Developed in 1977 streets include – Prairie View, Prairie Court and Ponder Drive.


Forest Glen Subdivision – Streets in this addition include – Forest Glen Drive, Ascot Way, Wilshire Drive and Maris Cove.




Top picture – Sign at the entrance to Ironhorse Golf Course.










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
